

Dear Church Family:

Today is Palm Sunday, also known as Passion Sunday. We celebrate and commemorate Our Lord Jesus Christ's victorious entry into Jerusalem. All the four Gospels speak about Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and the people shouted His praises. For us, it marks the beginning of Holy Week and those very special days of the Sacred Triduum which bring us great grace even today. Please refer to the bulletin and website for days and extra times for the Sacrament of Penance- Tuesday, April 15th and on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, to prepare yourself for Easter.



The Sacred Triduum: In this 2025 Jubilee of Hope, the days of the Sacred Triduum enable us to walk with Our Lord, as Pilgrims of Hope, entering into His Passion, Death and Resurrection so we may be transformed by His sacrificial love. I strongly encourage you and your family to come and celebrate Holy Thursday, Good Friday, The Solemn Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday.

April 17th-Holy Thursday, the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00PM at St. Charles Borromeo Church. As members of our Partnering Parishes, let us renew our love and reverence for the Most Holy Eucharist and the gift of Christ's Priesthood. After the evening Mass, take part in the ancient custom of visiting at least three Churches (seven at the most) that evening, recalling the Lord's prayer and agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, His unjust arrest, and trial condemning Him to death. St. Charles Borromeo Church will remain open to 10:00PM.

April 18th -Good Friday- A Day of Fast (limit to one full meal and 2 smaller meals) and Abstinence from meat. We fast and abstain to honor Christ's Crucifixion and Death, and to show by our sacrifice that we will never forget His tremendous love that gives us the hope of our salvation. Come and take part in the Celebration of the Lord's Passion at 3:00PM at St., Charles Borromeo Church.

Stations of the Cross on Good Friday at 12:00 Noon at St. Charles and again at 7:00PM at Sacred Heart Church, Clifton Heights.

April 19th -Holy Saturday---there is no Mass until the Solemn Easter Vigil at 8:00PM. It is a day that we continue to observe the fast and abstinence from Good Friday as we quietly reflect on the Lord's Passion and Death and make final preparations to celebrate Easter Sunday.

April 20th -Easter Sunday, the Solemn Feast of feasts, we celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus, who conquered sin and death. Come to Holy Mass and renew your Baptismal Promises so that you can be a more faithful missionary disciple of the Lord spreading His joy and hope in our world today!

Continue to bask in the light of God's eternal love by coming to Church every Sunday (or at the anticipated Mass on Saturday evening). Next Sunday, April 27, 2025, is the Second Sunday of Easter, the Sunday of Divine Mercy with 10:00A.M. Mass. Then our special Divine Mercy Devotions 1:00- 3:45P.M., and then the 4:00P.M. Evening Mass.

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Palm Sunday Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Each of us is drawn into the story of the Passion, particularly if the 3 parish lectors present it with clarity and realism in their voices. I believe this narrative does this like no other, because the Jesus story is ours as well. We know and believe that we are the indirect cause of Jesus' pain. It was our sins, big and little, that drove in the nails and made Him hang there on that cross of shame.

We find ourselves almost exactly 2 months from February 14. Valentine's day, when our attention was focused on warm romantic love, even as snow lay on the ground and may have canceled many a romantic dinner. The story of Our Lord's Passion drives home the facts about real love of neighbor. "Greater love than this no man has: that he lay down his life for his friend." That is the famous caption for the picture. That is what Jesus did for us even though we were and are still to a large extent: sinners.

Add to this the fact that Jesus is God, and the whole story heard on a higher level. How dare we say that God does not love us? Check out the nearest crucifix for the opposite truth.

Imagine, if you will, what you would do if someone were to harm you physically. Or hurt you with malicious untrue gossip. You would certainly have righteous indignation. And perhaps a handy fist. How different is our loving God!

What we blandly call "the Passion Narrative" is really a chronicle of the worst injustice ever done by man to a Man. A man who is also God Himself. Don't be too quick to insert yourself in the adoring crowd laying down palm for Jesus on a donkey to walk over. Instead, see yourself among those who picked up the nails for the soldiers to use. The confessional is the place for reconciliation with the Man on the donkey.

How better to end these thoughts than by praying together the traditional Act of Contrition which still says it best:

"O my God, I am heartily sorry for my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell. But most of all because they have offended Thee, my God, who art all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to confess my sins; do penance; and avoid the near occasions of sin. Amen."

God love you, and have a meaningful Holy Week.

Palm Sunday

Also known as Passion Sunday, this Sunday before Easter remembers Jesus" triumphant entry into Jerusalem near the end of a public ministry spent almost entirely outside Israel's capital city. When Jesus entered the city with his entourage, people laid palm branches on the road before him and greeted him as the longawaited Messiah, shouting, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Their celebrating didn't last long. As they heard his teachings and saw his behavior, both religious leaders and people on the streets turned against Jesus. Within days, the adoring crowds were shouting, "Crucify him!" Each Gospel relates the next few days differently, but the common elements are:

* Jesus entered Jerusalem and began to teach the people about the Kingdom of God and the leaders about their hypocrisy and God's coming judgment;

* He threw money-changers out of the Temple and sparked a growing conspiracy against him; he shared a "last supper' with his friends;

* He was betrayed by Judas Iscariot, one of his key disciples; and, after being arrested, was handed over to the Roman authorities for execution as an enemy of Caesar. Palm Sunday worship typically begins with a Procession of Palms and then moves on to chronicle the rest of the week with a somber reading of the Passion in which the rejection, suffering and death of Jesus are on full display and Christians are reminded that their faith originates in Jesus" humble submission to death on a cross. Worship typically ends in silence, and the stage is set for Holy Week.
