

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

May I ask you: "How do you take a compliment? I specify one delivered to you in person, and not electronically via email or text. It may take a minute to fashion a reply because, at least for the majority of us, compliments received are rare.

I remember a conversation I had with a good Church worker back around Christmastime. After recalling an episode or two from his unwritten record, he said, "know Father, people are always ready to complain about something, but never to praise or even thank you for your work." Enough said.

An old-fashioned reaction to praise comes right out of the script of an old Western movie, when a pretty lady compliments the hero. It went something like this: "Aw shucks, ma'am, tweren't nuthin." In other words, denying that whatever we did or said was good and deeply appreciated. It's false humility to deny the truth. A simple but humble "thank you" is always best to respond, unless one wants to add praise to God.

In today's Gospel passage, coming early in St. Matthew's account of the Sermon on the Mount, we find Jesus complimenting His hearers. Using references to two well-known entities of the time, He told them they were both "salt and light." An explanation of terms is needed here.

First, regarding salt. In those ancient days, long before refrigeration was even an idea, salt was a principal preservative for foods. It still is these days. Note the sodium percentage on the labels. Foods are often designated "low salt" for the sake of people with health issues. Certain foods are prized for having "no preservatives." But back in biblical times, salt was precious. So prized that a Roman soldier would receive a portion of his pay in salt. Hence the Latin derivative turned into our modern English word "salary."

In considering "light" as a compliment, think of an ordinary one room Palestinian home in those days. It existed in a world "lit only by fire." A burning oil lamp made ordinary life possible after dark. So, to be called a "light" in such a world was indeed a high compliment. Of course, Our Lord was referring to spiritual darkness above all. How to shed that kind of light is clearly offered in today's passage from Isaiah, which Matthew knew so well. He provides half a dozen ways to do so.

These often dull and dreary February days lend themselves to some healthy introspection. How consistent has our fidelity to Jesus and His Way been? Stripped of excuses, we can honestly take inventory. We can measure our progress on the path to Heaven.

In the end, I think the greatest compliment we can hope for will hopefully be given us by a smiling Jesus standing at Heaven's Gate. He will call us by name and say "Welcome home!" Meanwhile, here below, it is helpful to believe this closing thought about where else God dwells. God has two dwelling places: one in heaven and the other in a meek and thankful heart."

God love you and give you His peace.

Say the Word

I have some illustrations left, but I need a lot of readers." One girl said right away that she would color, but as I turned away to get the sheet, she asked, "How much would I have to read? I have a stutter." I showed her what she would have to read, and she agreed to do it. I was so proud of her. That kind of little sacrifice, doing something she was not that comfortable doing, to lead others in prayer, and help me out, is a step towards the big sacrifices that are needed to follow Jesus to Calvary and to the Resurrection.

FYI, in case you're wondering why we are preparing for Stations of the Cross so early, it is because I will be in the Philippines for two weeks, accompanying our General Superior as she visits our Convents there. Please keep our trip in your prayers. PREP will keep going in my absence, but when I get back it will be Lent! It doesn't hurt to start preparing for the sacrifices of Lent, even during this season of Ordinary Time.

Prayers for PREP

Jesus, You are the Way, the Truth, and the Life. As we reflect on the path you followed, we see many difficulties and challenges, but also so much beauty and love. Please help your children in our parishes to follow You, in offering sacrifices and in praising God. Amen.
