

March 24, 2024 Palm Sunday

Dear Church Family:

Today is Palm Sunday, also known as Passion Sunday. We celebrate and commemorate Our Lord Jesus Christ's victorious entry into Jerusalem. All the four Gospels speak about Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and the people shouted His praises. For us, it marks the beginning of Holy Week and those very special days of the Sacred Triduum which bring us great grace even today. Please refer to the bulletin and website for days and times for the Sacrament of Penance to prepare yourself for Holy Week and Easter.

The Sacred Triduum: The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Sacred Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Although chronologically they are three separate days, they are liturgically one day which unfolds the Paschal Mystery of Christ's love for us. It marks the end of the Lenten season and propels us to the Mystery of Easter-both the Solemn Vigil and Easter Sunday.

Although the days of the Sacred Triduum are not Holy Days of Obligation, they offer us much grace as we reflect on God's great love in the Passion, Death and Resurrection of His Only-Begotten Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ.

I realize many people go away for Easter. Where you go away or stay home, I strongly encourage you and your family to come and celebrate Holy Thursday, the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7PM at St. Charles Borromeo Church. In this time of the Eucharistic Revival, come and renew your love and reverence for His Presence in the Most Holy Eucharist, and for the gift of the Priesthood. After the evening Mass, take part in the ancient custom of visiting at least three Churches that evening, recalling the Lord's prayer and agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, His unjust arrest, and trial condemning Him to death. St. Charles Borromeo Church will remain open to 10PM.

Good Friday is a Day of Fast (limit to one full meal and 2 smaller meals) and Abstinence from meat. We fast and abstain to honor Christ's Crucifixion and Death, and to show by our sacrifice that we will never forget His tremendous love that gives us the hope of our salvation. Come and take part in the Celebration of the Lord's Passion at 3PM at St., Charles Borromeo Church and contemplate His Cross -a constant reminder of His love for us. Stations of the Cross at 12noon at St. Charles and again at 7PM at Sacred Heart Church, Clifton Heights.

Holy Saturday---there is no Mass until the Solemn Easter Vigil at 7:30PM. It is a day that we continue to observe the fast and abstinence from Good Friday as we quietly reflect on the Lord's Passion and Death and make final preparations to celebrate Easter Sunday. The Blessing of the Easter Food will be at 12Noon at Sacred Heart.

March 31, 2024, is **Easter Sunday**, the Solemn Feast of feasts, we celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus, who conquered sin and death. Come to Holy Mass and renew your Baptismal Promises so that you can be a more faithful missionary disciple of the Lord spreading His joy and hope in our world today!

Continue to bask in the light of God's eternal love by coming to Church every Sunday (or at the anticipated Mass on Saturday evenings). Next Sunday, April 7, 2024, is the Second Sunday of Easter and the Sunday of Divine Mercy in which we will have **special Divine Mercy Devotions beginning at 12Noon to 3pm that day as well.**

Palm Sunday Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

The overhead camera work used on a televised football game has something in common with an item needed for a family group photo. Both need perspective. The kind that can only come when the photographer steps back from his subject so that the viewer catches the whole scene.

I believe we can gain a better appreciation of the Lord's Passion account if we figuratively "step back" from the milieu our minds produce. Consider the many homilies we have heard over the years; the many movie versions of the events, and even the well-written New Testament commentaries we may have read, and how they influence our imaginations as we hear the words every Holy Week.

Why pull away from one or more of those? In order to gain a personal perspective of the well-known events. To be spiritually and physically alone in their presence, as if you were the only observer. Mark's version that we hear today is the major part of his shortest of the four gospels.

The whole gospel can be read in less than an hour. But what matters is your reaction just to the Passion account. Various lines will pop out, so to speak, and compel you to pause for reflection.

For me, there is a line that comes early on, when Jesus addresses His disciples by saying: "The poor you will always have with you, and whenever you wish you can do good to them, but you will not always have Me." Of course He meant His physical presence, with no reference to His miraculous presence in the Holy Eucharist. Yet we can wonder what His physical presence might mean. When we hopefully reach heaven we shall be blessed with it. But in the meantime wouldn't it be consoling? I think of saints like Mary Magdalene, or Sr. Faustina, all of whom had the privilege.

Something to think about as we step back from our ordinary pondering of the words that we read or hear this week.

Meanwhile we await the message of the event on the Third Day, trusting that our decision to live as He asked us to will yield the moment when He steps forward to give us a hug of welcome to eternal joy.

Fasting Good Friday Ages 18-59

Abstinence From Meat Every Friday During Lent Ages 14 and up

On Good Friday, March 29, 2024, we celebrate the mystery of the Lord's Passion and contemplate Jesus' sacrifice to redeem humanity from sin and death. It has been our long-standing tradition to offer alms in support of the Catholic Community in the Holy Land each year on this day. They are used to maintain the sacred places, to provide educational and pastoral programs, and to serve the needs of the poor through established charitable institutions. Palm Sunday

Also known as Passion Sunday, this Sunday before Easter remembers Jesus" triumphant entry into Jerusalem near the end of a public ministry spent almost entirely outside Israel's capital city. When Jesus entered the city with his entourage, people laid palm branches on the road before him and greeted him as the long-awaited Messiah, shouting, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Their celebrating didn't last long. As they heard his teachings and saw his behavior, both religious leaders and people on the streets turned against Jesus. Within days, the adoring crowds were shouting, "Crucify him!" Each Gospel relates the next few days differently, but the common elements are:

- * Jesus entered Jerusalem and began to teach the people about the Kingdom of God and the leaders about their hypocrisy and God's coming judgment;
- * He threw money-changers out of the Temple and sparked a growing conspiracy against him; he shared a "last supper" with his friends;
- * He was betrayed by Judas Iscariot, one of his key disciples; and, after being arrested, was handed over to the Roman authorities for execution as an enemy of Caesar. Palm Sunday worship typically begins with a Procession of Palms and then moves on to chronicle the rest of the week with a somber reading of the Passion in which the rejection, suffering and death of Jesus are on full display and Christians are reminded that their faith originates in Jesus" humble submission to death on a cross. Worship typically ends in silence, and the stage is set for Holy Week.
