

Third Sunday of Lent Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

"Powerhouse" can be defined in a few ways, As a simple plant that produces power. Or as a person who possesses great force of energy, as in "She is an editorial powerhouse." Today I want to call on the word as an apt description of this weekend's Readings for Mass.

First comes the Ten Commandments from the Book of Exodus. They are stark, confident, certifiably the divine basics on how to live for a largely illiterate people. Later on in history, the Church will elaborate on their meanings for a more sophisticated audience. So, for example, "Thou shalt not kill" will expand to include more subtle killings, like the reckless use of illicit drugs.

We move on to St. Paul's Letter, where he contrasts Jewish and Greek religious aspirations with that of the Christian's. featuring a crucified Jesus as "the wisdom and power of God." He is blunt and straightforward but impactful.

Then we come to the highly dramatic and demonstrably divine act of Jesus, angrily cleansing His "Father's House," the Temple, of the rank commercialism that had become common there. This Jesus follows with His symbolic prediction of His death and resurrection.

This threefold combination of Readings here in the middle of Lent leaves us a little breathless, partly because we moderns have become so used to the subtlety mostly used by Satan and the societal enemies of Christ prevalent in our present culture. Yet I find the whole ensemble refreshing, like a hot shower after work or play in the cold. Or a cold shower after the same in summer's heat.

Here is our one true God, soon to be a crucified corpse followed by a total resurrection prepared for and praised, yet remaining fully human as was the Babe at Bethlehem. Able to take on all the various forms of negativity we face in life with the positive outlook unique to Himself. He only asks His followers, you and me, to take on what we can and do so with His help.

So it is Lent, this penitential season where we face not only the exterior, but also the interior darkness we often take on because we think it's light. The true Light will blaze forth on the morning of the Third Day, and we will know whose pledge for redemption is the real one.

What a "powerhouse" Faith we are offered; what a confident Hope we gain; what a contagious Charity we can practice! All because of Jesus Christ our Lord!

May God love you and give you His peace!



Say the Word

"Do you know what this is for?" I asked the Level 3 student. "Umm, it's like the rosary," he responded. I hadn't thought of it that way, but the Lenten Prayer Chains we made are like the rosary. One chain for each day from now until Easter, just like the rosary has one bead for each prayer. Each chain has a prayer to say and after you pray the prayer, you tear off the chain. On March 31, you'll get to the chain that says, "Sing Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!" and rejoice in the Easter Anthem. The chains



are also color coordinated to match the liturgical calendar (not complicated until you get to Holy Week!)

These prayer chains were part of our Stations of the Cross and Lent Family Night for PREP. These opportunities for families to pray together, do some faith related crafts, meet other families living out their Catholic faith, and just have a good time are in imitation of

Jesus' ministry here on earth. He spent many hours just talking to people, building relationships, and teaching "along the way." Where is He speaking to you this Lent? Is He trying to speak through you to others, as well?

The Third Week of Lent

With this week, we conclude the first part of Lent, We continue our lessons in the faith, as our practices of Lent become deeper and more full of grace. We enter into this week reflecting upon the Scrutiny that makes up our intense prayer for those Elect, preparing for Baptism. And, as we beg, as Church, that they be freed from sin and from all anxiety, we ask those same desires for ourselves. The simple and powerful words of the Opening Prayer guides our daily prayer. We continue to wake each morning, pausing to ask for the graces we desire for the day. Throughout each day, the background of our thoughts and feelings is more and more taken up with what this journey means for our personal change of heart, the renewal of our Baptismal commitment to be placed with Jesus, and our growing desire to act in solidarity with the poor. We go to bed each evening, after pausing to give thanks for the gifts of the day.

Lenten Patterns: Practicing Generosity

Almsgiving has always been an important part of Lent. Generosity is not simply giving excess clothes to a place where poor people might purchase them. It's not even writing a "generous" check at the time a collection is taken up for a cause that benefits the poor. These are wonderful practices. Generosity is an attitude. It is a sense that no matter how much we have, all that we have is a gift, and given to be shared. It means that sharing with others in need should be a personal priority. A spirit of self-less giving means that one needs to share what they have with others. Lent is a wonderful time to practice self-less giving, because it takes practice. This kind of self-sacrificing generosity is a religious experience. It joins us with Jesus, who gave himself completely, for us. Establishing new patterns of giving will give real life and joy to Lent.
